Pay Online Using Direct Pay (for individual taxpayers)

Use this secure service to pay your individual tax bill or estimated tax payment directly from your checking or savings account at no cost to you.

Pay Using the Electronic Federal Tax Payment System (EFTPS)

- Pay online at eftps.gov or by phone at 1-800-555-4477
- Users must enroll before submitting a payment
- EFTPS is offered free by the U.S. Department of Treasury
- Available for both individuals and businesses

Initiate an Electronic Funds Withdrawal (EFW)

- When filing your taxes using tax preparation software or through a tax professional, authorize an EFW from your checking or savings account
- The IRS doesn't charge a fee

Pay by Debit or Credit Card

- Make your payment through a service provider
- A convenience fee is charged by the service provider. The IRS doesn't receive or charge any fees for payments made with a debit or credit card
- Payments can be submitted online, by phone, a mobile device or using IRS e-file tax preparation software

Mail a Check or Money Order

Send your payment to the address on your bill (if you have one), or you can locate the mailing addresses at IRS.gov/Payments or on the instructions for most forms

Apply for an Installment Agreement
